

# **Looking For A Good Book?**




The South Park Historical Society has published two books about the history of our community:

#### Curry Couple's Daughter And 5 Sons in Service



"There are six stars in the window of the home of Mr. and Mrs. William J. Williams, of Curry, Pa., today. For Sam Williams, former guard at the government's experimental mine in Bruceton, has gone to join his sister and four brothers in this country's service.

"Sam is the last one at home to go," said Mrs. Williams in a voice filled with patriotic pride and a bit of loneliness. "He didn't pass the first time and he felt badly about it. It, for his younger brothers had gone. But this time he passed and he is so glad. Of course I'm proud of them. But it is going to be pretty lonely with just my husband and I at home. And it is hard

to cook for just two when I've always had 10 or 11 around the house."

Mr. and Mrs. Williams have eight children, six boys and two girls. One son, Roger, is married and has two small sons. One daughter is married. She is Mrs. Henry Krupitzer, of Curry, and the mother of one small son. The other six are in the service. Their names, listed in the order in which they joined the service are: Lester E. Williams, 23, staff sergeant with the Army Air Corps in Panama; Charles E. Williams, 34, private first class with the Army Air Corps at Miami Beach, Fla.; Frank Williams, 17, seaman second class with the Naval Air Station, Jacksonville, Fla.; Lt. Mae Williams, 24, Army Nurse Corps, Camp Lee, Va.; David Williams, 20, studying to be a torpedo man at the Naval Training Station, Newport, R. I., and Sam, 36, United States Army, leaving today.

"Mae reported for duty with the Army Nurse Corps in October," Mrs. Williams said, "and she likes it very much." She was graduated from the Mercy Hospital School of Nursing in Pittsburgh in 1941

and remained on duty there until she joined the Army. Lester, the first to go into the service, enlisted nearly three years ago at the age of 20. He attended Brentwood High School one year and then was graduated from the Connelly Trade School in Pittsburgh after three years of study. He is a staff sergeant and has been on duty in Panama nearly two years. He has not had a furlough since he enlisted, his mother said. She is hoping he may have one in February when his three-year enlistment is ended. She added: "I haven't seen him in all that time, you know."

Charles was a coal miner before he went into the Army Air Corps. David worked in the Pittsburgh Shops at Library, Pa., for a time after he was graduated from Snowden High School. He enlisted in the Navy and reported the last week in October. Frank, who will be 18 next January 26, always had his "mind set on the Navy," his mother said. As soon as he completed his high school studies last June, he enlisted. "He loves it," his mother continued." In one letter he wrote "tell Dad he sent the Navy a boy and the Navy will send back a man."

Mr. and Mrs. Williams will observe their 39th wedding anniversary on January 21. They were married in Curry and have lived there since. On February 27, Mrs. Williams will be 59, and on February 3, Mr. Williams will be 71. Though they live in Curry, their post office is Broughton, Pa."

#### **Consol Shuts Mine, Lays Off 61 Workers**

"Sixty-one hourly employees lost jobs at Consolidation Coal Co's Montour No. 10 Mine in Library yesterday because the mine is worked out.

Consol announced that 16 hourly employees will stay on the job temporarily until equipment is removed from the mine. Nine salaried employees also will continue on the job to conclude closure. Six others will be transferred to other Consol operations.

Consol also announced that production has been cut back slightly at its Westland No.1 mine in Washington County with 14 hourly employees furloughed yesterday. General economic conditions in the coal industry were blamed for the layoff."
